

# **Albion's Plain a Bryniau Cymru Furth Hills**

Some lists of English and Welsh hills  
according to Scottish criteria

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# 1 Introduction

Years have rolled on, Loch na Garr, since I left you,  
Years must elapse ere I tread you again:  
Nature of verdure and flowers has bereft you,  
Yet still you are dearer than Albion's plain.  
England! thy beauties are tame and domestic,  
To one who has roved o'er the mountains afar:  
Oh for the crags that are wild and majestic!  
The steep frowning glories of dark Loch na Garr.

No reader of *The Angry Corrie* [34] can be unaware that its editor and many contributors regard the hills south of the border as negligible in comparison with Scotland's, both in size and number. This booklet will no doubt confirm their opinion, because it lists some hills of England and Wales<sup>1</sup> according to Scottish criteria: the Furth Munros, Furth Corbetts, Furth Grahams and so on. These lists are indeed so short that all of them combined barely make a booklet.

I claim no credit for collecting the data listed here; they are largely drawn from the most useful Database of British Hills [35]; I am grateful to those who worked to compile it. But as far as I know there is no other convenient publication listing these hills for easy reference. I have avoided repeating lists which are essentially the Hewitts, since the excellent Tacit tables list these hills both for England [7] and Wales [8].

It is perhaps interesting to note that England would have had even fewer such hills if King Malcolm I or David I been able to maintain their rule over the Lake District; at the time of the Domesday Book it was not part of England. If Henry II had not succeeded in (re)conquering it, there would be no English Furth Munros, at most two English Furth Corbetts, and several fewer English Furth Grahams.

The columns of the tables should be largely self-explanatory; the detailed definitions are as for the Database of British Hills. I have omitted a field for date of first ascent, since I am of the school of thought which says that dates, in the context of hillwalking, are rather a source of carbohydrate and fibre. I have included the height in feet, as well as in metres, because the criteria for many of these lists are expressed in terms of feet. The lists are in descending order of drop.

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<sup>1</sup>I have listed hills on the Isle of Man where applicable, too, even though historically Man was held by Scotland before England.

Together most of the hills listed here might be called the High Marilyn's (height at least 1500 ft = 457 m, drop at least 150 m) in the area covered. Thus they are broadly comparable to the 'High Hills' series of booklets [44] published by Mark Trengove (slightly greater height: at least 500 m, lower drop requirement, of at least 100 m).

In June 2010 Alan Dawson circulated a proposal<sup>2</sup> [9] to define new lists which are based on the Munros, Corbetts, and Grahams, but with height and drop cut-offs rounded to the nearest 50 m; thus the New Munros have height at least 900 m, drop at least 100 m; the New Corbetts 750–899 m; the Dochartys (effectively New Grahams) 600–749 m. I also add the New Bairds, 450–599 m; all except the New Munros have drop at least 150 m. The additional hills these lists add for England and Wales are shown here in italics.

All hill lists I know of list the OS map numbers, if they mention maps at all. To redress the balance somewhat, I have instead identified the relevant Harvey map; perhaps it is appropriate that these lists, indicating how tributary England and Wales are to Scotland, should refer to maps made in Scotland. The maps are listed in table 15 at the end by the last section of their ISBN, apart from the check digit; Harvey do not use sheet numbers.<sup>3</sup> Those who want OS map numbers can refer to the Database.

## 2 Furth Kilometros

The Kilometros have height at least 1000 m, prominence at least 100 m. The term 'Kilometros' was introduced, as far as I know, by Mark Trengove in his booklet listing such hills in the Highlands [38].

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Table 1 is, I believe, the first publication of this list. I claim the honour of being the first official Compleatist of the English Furth Kilometros.

Table 2 lists the Furth Kilometros of Wales. Harvey Maps and the Ordnance Survey agree on 999 m for Glyder Fawr; it is not clear to me whether this height includes the summit rocks, which are more than a metre high; thus it might be that it also qualifies.

### 3 Furth Munros

The (Furth) Munros have height at least 3000 ft, with no clear prominence criterion.

The SMC Tables [1] list the Furth Munros, but do not make a distinction between Tops and principal Furth Munros. However, it is fairly clear which should be Tops. My personal judgement is confirmed by applying the criteria identified by Mark Jackson. He points out [37] that if you ‘regularize’ the Munros by selecting hills in Scotland with height at least 3000 ft, and prominence at least 300 ft, then you end up with a list which has the same number of hills as the official list of Munros, and with over 90% of hills in common. Thus (absent a decision by the SMC committee regarding these hills) it makes sense to use a prominence of 300 ft (about 91 m) as the cut-off point between Furth Munros and Tops.

Tables 3 and 4 show the Furth Munros of England and Wales respectively, with the tops under their principal Furth Munro; the tops are indented. Some additional 3000 ft minor tops are also listed, in *italic*. Furth New Munros are in *italics*, unindented.

Birkett [2] lists the three minor bumps on Skiddaw’s summit ridge, and Helvellyn Lower Man. Oddly he does not list Symonds Knott. None are Furth Munro Tops.

Crib y Ddysgyl is also known as Garnedd Ugain; Garnedd Uchaf as Carnedd Gwenllian. Castell y Gwynt is a new Nuttall (only in the third edition of their book), but not a Furth Munro Top.

### 4 Furth Murdos

The Murdos have height at least 3000 ft, with prominence at least 30 m. Murdos were introduced by Alan Dawson [6]. There is no need to list Furth Murdos since they are the same as the Furth Munros and Tops listed earlier.

## 5 Furth Corbetts

The Corbetts have height between 2500 ft and 3000 ft, with prominence at least 500 ft. Here hills between 150 m and 500 ft prominence would also be included if there were any. Tables 5 and 6 list them for England and Wales respectively. Furth New Corbetts are in italics.

It is not as well known as it should be that Corbett did make lists of hills in England and Wales of height 2500 ft, which he called the ‘twenty-fives’. These lists were published in the Rucksack Club Journal [3, 4] and have been made more conveniently available on Richard Moss’ web site [41]. These however had no minimum prominence – a few were merely spot heights on a slope. The maps from which he worked were not very accurate, and the lists include some remarks made in criticism of the maps. When the list of (Scottish) Corbetts was first published [5], after Corbett’s death, the editor of the article did not appreciate the worth of a minimum prominence criterion, writing:

... perhaps, at some later date, we may see a revised Edition, comprehensive of every 2,500-foot summit.

The Corbett Tops go some way towards fulfilling this, but it is hard to see what would be gained by listing every trivial rise above 2500 ft.

Furth Corbett Tops, with minimum height 2500 ft, prominence 30 m, (whether of furth Munros, or furth Corbetts) are not listed here. They are just a height slice of the Hewitts.

## 6 Furth Grahams

The Grahams have height between 2000 ft and 2500 ft, with prominence at least 150 m.<sup>4</sup> Table 8 lists them for England, table 9 for Wales; and table 7 for the Isle of Man. Furth Dochartys (New Grahams) are in italics.

Furth Graham Tops, with minimum height 2000 ft, prominence 30 m, (whether of furth Munros, furth Corbetts or furth Grahams) are just a lower height slice of the Hewitts and are not listed here.

## 7 Furth Donalds

Donalds have minimum height 2000 ft, and also a minimum separation from higher ground, based on a combination of prominence and isolation [1].

The Furth Donalds have all been listed by Richard Webb [45]. They are not included here partly because there are so many, partly because they are essentially a list intermediate between Nuttalls and Hewitts, containing all Hewitts [7, 8] and many Nuttalls [43, 42], which are well listed elsewhere.

The Furth New Donalds (minimum height 2000 ft, prominence 30 m) [10] are identical to the Hewitts.

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<sup>4</sup>It seems illogical to me that Grahams have a prominence criterion in metres, when Corbetts use feet. But it seems to be the accepted definition. In any case, I include here hills between 150 m and 500 ft prominence: they are Seat Sandal and Lovely Seat, both in England.

## 8 Furth Bairds

The Bairds have height between 1500 ft and 2000 ft, with prominence at least 150 m.

Although, as Mark Jackson says in his booklet listing the Bairds [36], they are yet another height slice of the Marilynns (below Corbetts and Grahams), it is nevertheless true that the Furth Bairds contain many appealing hills, the list is sufficiently small, and they are not elsewhere published,<sup>5</sup> so I include them here in table 12 for England, table 10 for Wales, and table 11 for the Isle of Man. Furth New Bairds (height 450–600 m, with prominence at least 150 m) are shown in *italic*.

## B Harvey map numbers

Table 15 lists the Harvey maps referred to in the main tables, with brief titles. Most of these numbers are the title identifier from the ISBN. Earlier maps do not have ISBNs, and for these I have used the last two digits of the year of publication, followed by a letter.

It should be noted that sometimes Harvey bring out a new edition and (rather improperly) change it substantially while keeping the same ISBN. For example, an older Lakeland West includes an extension on the reverse covering Blake Fell, but this is not true of the current one.

A few hills are only covered by their maps of long-distance paths; these do not cover land very far from the path in question (usually 2–5 km).

There are many hills listed here which are not covered by a Harvey map, especially in Wales and the Shropshire hills.
